

What is the Household Hazardous and E-waste Recycling Event?

A once-a-year collection of household hazardous chemical wastes.

E-waste (electronics) and refrigerant wastes (household cooling appliances) are also accepted!

Who is eligible to participate?

Any Kenosha County resident!

What electronics are accepted?

- Computers, including laptops
- Keyboards, mice, etc.
- Stereos
- TVs and VCRs
- Scanners
- iPods, DVD, CD & MP3 players
- Phones (including cell phones)
- Copiers
- Toner cartridges
- Electronic toys Hair dryers
- Water coolers
- Refrigerators
- Vacuums
- Toesters
- Stoves
- Freezers
- Microwaves
- Dishwashers
- Washers/dryers
- Air conditioners
- Dehumidifiers Water heaters

What household waste can I bring?

Kitchen/Bathroom

How should I handle and transport the hazardous waste?

Keep products in original containers.

Seal containers tightly to avoid leaking. Place it in a leak-proof container.

Do not mix products together.

Pack containers in sturdy boxes in the trunk or in the rear of your vehicle.

Store products away from kids, pets and fire.

Mosquito Control

HELPFUL TIPS & RESOURCES

Personal Protection

By adjusting your habits, you can limit mosquito populations and protect yourself and your community from Mosquito-borne diseases. Small actions like dumping standing water, filling in potholes, and regularly trimming shrubbery can help thwart mosquito breeding and prevent the spread of diseases like Zika, Dengue, and Yellow Fever.

Agricultural Tips

Mosquitoes aren't just a nuisance—and danger—to humans, they may also have a negative impact on farming and agriculture. In fact, many harmful mosquito-borne diseases can be transmitted to animals, including West Nile Virus and Eastern Equine Encephalitis.

Pesticide Information

It's common to pair proactive mosquito control techniques with other effective strategies. Larvicides and adulticides are frequently applied as part of an integrated management approach that impedes mosquitoes during all stages of the life cycle. These EPA-registered products work to safely target mosquitoes while preserving the health of the surrounding ecosystem and community.

To help with Mosquito Control in the community, follow this prevention checklist:

Mosquito Prevention Checklist:

FOR YOU:

- Use <u>EPA-approved repellents</u> on skin and clothing (always follow product label directions for use).
- Wear long sleeve shirts and long pants that are loose fitting for extra protection.
- If you are outdoors at dusk and dawn, when many mosquito species are most active, protect yourself.
- Encourage friends, family, and neighbors to follow these recommendations also.

FOR YOUR LAWN:

- Keep grass cut and shrubbery trimmed near the house where adult mosquitoes may rest.
- Water lawns and gardens carefully to prevent water from standing for more than five days.
- Keep drains, ditches, and culverts clean of weeds and trash so water can flow properly.
- Fill in, or drain, low spots (puddles, ruts, etc.) in the yard where water collects.
- Fill in tree holes and hollow stumps that hold water with sand or concrete.
- Stock ornamental pools with top feeding predacious fish species such as minnows.

FOR YOUR RESIDENCE:

- Clean debris from rain gutters to allow proper drainage.
- Check around outdoor faucets and air conditioner units and repair leaks or puddles.
- Check window and door screens to ensure they are in good condition and seal tightly.
- Eliminate seepage from cisterns, cesspools, and septic tanks.

FOR YOUR OUTDOOR RECREATIONAL EQUIPMENT AND CHILDREN'S TOYS:

- Canoes and Boats: Store small boats upside down. Cover large boats tightly.
- Make sure that coverings (boats, pools, compost piles, etc.) are pulled tight and sloped to allow water to drain.
- Empty plastic wading pools at least once per week and store indoors when not in use.
- Make sure your backyard pool is properly cared for while away from the home.
- Drill holes in the bottom of tire swings to allow any water to drain.

FOR YOUR UTILITY AND DECORATIVE CONTAINERS:

- Cover trash and recycling containers to keep out rainwater.
- Dispose of old tires, cans, buckets, bottles, or any other water holding containers.
- Change the water in pet bowls, birdbaths, plant pots or drip trays at least once per week.

Fire Safety

- ·Smoke alarms should be on every level of the nome, outside each sleeping area and inside every pedroom.
- · Carpon monoxide (CO) alarms should be on every level of the home outside sleeping areas.
- Have a fire escape plan (two ways out each room)
- Make sure there is a fire extinguisher in the home.

Child Safety

- · Avoid deadly tip overs, don't let children climb on furniture.
- Keep cleaning supplies in a locked cabinet or out of reach of children
- Keep all window cords out of reach of children.
- · Keep baby's sleep space free from pillows and blankets and use cribs that meet CPSC standards
- Protect children Be aware of a potentially deadly gap between interior and exterior doors of nome elevators

Pool Safely Tips

- · Always watch kids in and around the water.
- · Keep children away from pool drains.
- · Know how to perform CPR on children and aduits.
- · Make sure kids learn to swim.

Keep the address of the home visible in case of emergency

Highlighting Local Business







USEFUL INFORMATION

Please visit our website villageofbristol.org to make the following types of payments (except Burn Permits):

*Payments can be made at the village office during office hours or can be placed in the drop box located by the front entrance doors. If you would like a receipt, please include a self-addressed stamped envelope.

BURN PERMITS (payments not available online)

Outdoor fires require a burn permit which is valid January-December. Please call the Fire Department Burn Line at 857-4063 for the current burn status just prior to burning. Permits can be purchased at the Village Hall during regular business hours or at the Fire Department nights and weekends. First time permits are \$25, and renewals are \$15.

BUILDING PERMITS

If you are doing any type of home renovations, please visit our website and complete a <u>building permit</u> application. A <u>zoning permit</u> is also required in addition to the building permit if you are building a garage, shed, fence, accessory building, or adding on to a building.

CREDIT CARD PAYMENTS at the Village Office

The Village of Bristol is now accepting credit card payments in the village office for anything payable to the village. There is a convenience fee of 3%.

ONLINE PAYMENTS NOW AVAILABLE!

Payments can now be made online for: sewer/water bills, taxes, invoices payable to the village, traffic citations, and building permits. There is a 2.75% convenience fee if paying with a debit or credit card, or a \$1.10 fee if paying by e-check. Visit our website to make your payments.

RECYCLING CENTER

Accepts: brush, grass, leaves, cooking oil, waste oil, anti-freeze, scrap steel.

Monday-Friday: 7am-3pm

Additional Hours: April-Nov: 1st & 3rd Wed. 3pm-6pm, and 1st & 3rd Sat. 9am-noon.

Dec-March: 1st Sat 9am-noon
