Streets To Be Closed for Slurry Sealing

The Village of Bristol has contracted with Struck and Irwin Paving Inc. to perform slurry sealing for the Village during the 2014 construction season.

Roads to be slurry sealed are:

198th Avenue (from 83rd street North to 80th Street)
199th Avenue (from 83rd street North to 80th Street)
82nd Street (from Hwy 45 east to end)
80th Street (from Hwy 45 east to 198th Avenue)
81st Street (from 198th Avenue east to 195th Avenue)
203rd Avenue (from 83rd Street to 85th Street)

The following areas will also spot treated

212th Avenue (from 117th Street to 118th Street)
213th Avenue (from Co Hwy. V to 119th Street)
213th Avenue (from 121st Street to 122nd Street)
214th Avenue (from Co. Hwy. V to 213th Avenue)
214th Avenue (from pt north of 119th Street to 121st Street)
117th Street (from 214th Avenue to east end of Street)
118th Street (from 212th Street to 213th Street)
119th Street (from 214th Avenue to east end of Street)
120th Street (from 214th Avenue to east end of Street)
121st Street (from 214th Avenue to east end of Street)
122nd Street (from 213th Avenue east to end of Street)

176th Avenue and 91st place

176th Avenue (from 93rd Street/Co. Hwy C north to end of Street)
91st Place (from 176th Avenue to end of Street)

Nelson Subdivision

136th Avenue (from Wilmot Rd/Cty Hwy C north to end)
90th Street (from east end of Street to west end of cul-de-sac)
91st Street (from 136th Avenue to end of cul-de-sac)
92nd Street (from 136th Avenue to end of cul-de-sac)

195th Avenue

195th Avenue (from 81st Street to 82nd Street) – *approx 255 sq yards*

School area roads

82nd Street (from 200th Avenue Hwy 45 to 203rd Avenue)

83rd Street (from 201st Avenue to 203rd Avenue)

201st Street (from 82nd Street to 83rd Street)

202nd Street (from 82nd Street to 83rd Street)

203rd Avenue (from 82nd Street to 83rd Street)



If your street is among those scheduled, it will be closed to all traffic for most of the day while the slurry is applied and for the duration of the curing time. At least one day prior to the street closing, you will receive a blue flyer from the contractor detailing the scope of the work and the exact date your street will be closed.

Each road will experience temporary closures for the full day to ensure the slurry seal sets properly. Please refrain from parking on the streets as this will only delay the process.

Slurry seal is a cost effective treatment that prolongs the life of the streets by reducing deterioration caused by weathering. The slurry seal process consists of applying a mixture of liquid asphalt and fine aggregate onto the pavement with a slurry machine. Driving on the slurry seal before the slurry seal has set-up and before the traffic control signs have been removed might damage your vehicle's paint finish and might cause tracking of tar onto your driveway. During the first week following the placement of the slurry seal, please try to avoid turning your vehicle sharply since doing so will scar the surface of the slurry seal. Main cracks in the streets will be sealed and depressional cracked areas may be spray coated prior to the seal coat.

Many people schedule to go visit someone, visit a park, out to eat, or shopping after work the day of the slurry seal project. This extra time will help out with the curing time required.

The Village of Bristol apologizes in advance for any inconvenience this work may cause and thanks you for your cooperation with the contractor.

2014 Summer Public Safety News

With summer finally here, the Public Safety Dept. would like to remind you of a couple of important ordinances that have been an issue the past couple of years.

Ordinance 8-1-3 Destruction of Noxious Weeds: The Village would like to remind its property owners of their responsibility to destroy noxious weeds. Weeds such as Canadian Thistles and Creeping Jenny are examples of Noxious Weeds and must be destroyed by the property owner. This not only violates Village ordinances (8-1-3) but also Wisconsin Statute 66.0407.

Ordinance 8-1-4 Regulation of Length of Lawn and Grasses: All lots other than agriculture and open conservation zoned areas maintain their grassy areas so they do not exceed 8 inches in height because it adversely affects the public's health and safety.

Ordinance 15-1-2 Building Permits and Inspection: No building of any kind shall be moved within or into the Village and no new building or structure, or any part thereof, shall hereafter be erected, or ground broken for the same, or enlarged, altered, moved, demolished, razed or used within the Village, except as herein provided, until a permit therefor shall first have been obtained by the owner, or his/her agent, from the Building Inspector or his/her designee. Any work that is done prior to obtaining a permit will be charged double the fees.

Ordinance 8-3-7 Illegal Dumping or Rummaging: It shall be unlawful for anyone to rummage through bulky waste and materials along the roadside unless acting with proper permission or authority.

(These bulk items help keep the cost of garbage service lower. Residents are asked if they see any scrapper other than John's Disposal coming through the neighborhood to write down the license plate number and vehicle description and call the (non-emergency) Sheriff's Department or our office).

Fireworks Prohibited in the Village—Ordinance 7-5-1

The sale of fireworks or the possession of fireworks with intent to sell within the Village of Bristol is hereby prohibited. "Fireworks" means anything manufactured, processed or packaged for exploding, emitting sparks or combustion which does not have another common use.

Always Remember to...

Get your burn permit if you have not done so already. Initial permit is \$25 and to renew your permit is \$15. You must also remember to follow the guidelines that are on the permit as conditions can change during the day. And, "Be kind to your neighbors when burning."

Have a Carbon Monoxide (CO) detector in your residence in the sleeping area. CO is a colorless, odorless gas that can kill you if there is a problem with gas appliances or the chimney flue is blocked.

Check your smoke detectors on a monthly basis and practice Exit Drills with a predetermined meeting place outside your residence.

Summer Safety for Your Pets

Hot weather can make us all uncomfortable, and it poses special risks for your dog. Keep the following safety concerns in mind as the temperature rises, and follow our tips to keep your dog cool.



Heat Hazards

- If your dog is outside on a hot day, make sure he has a shady spot to rest in. Doghouses are not good shelter during the summer as they can trap heat. You may want to fill a child's wading pool with fresh water for your dog to cool off in.
- Never leave your dog in a closed vehicle on a hot day. The temperature inside a car can rise to over 100 degrees in a matter of minutes.
- Always provide plenty of cool and fresh water.
- Avoid strenuous exercise on extremely hot days. Take walks in the early mornings or evenings, when the sun's heat is less intense.
- Try to avoid prolonged exposure to hot asphalt or sand, which can burn your pet's paws.
- Pets that are brachycephalic (short-faced), such as Bulldogs, Boxers, Japanese Chins, and Pekingese, have an especially hard time in the heat because they do not pant as efficiently as longer-faced dogs. Keep your brachycephalic dog inside with air-conditioning.
